COURSE TITLE: Implementing and Administering Microsoft Directory Services

COURSE CREDIT HOURS: 4

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Provides students with the knowledge and skills necessary to install, configure, and administer Microsoft Windows Active Directory service. Focuses on implementing Group Policy and understanding the Group Policy tasks required to centrally manage users and computers.

COURSE LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

Understand the logical and physical structure of Active Directory; configure the Domain Name System (DNS) server service to support Active Directory; create and administer user accounts and group resources; delegate and administer control of Active Directory objects; implement and use Group Policy; manage replication of Active Directory; and maintain and restore the database of Active Directory.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

The student will take notes in class and turn assigned material in for grading. The student will complete all quizzes, worksheets, lab experiments and tests with a satisfactory score. An examination will be given at the end of each major topic and a comprehensive final exam to complete the course.

COURSE FORMAT:

The class will be presented using formats that will include lectures, demonstrations, discussions, and group participation. Student participation and interaction is expected. In the laboratory, the student will perform assignments that will be monitored by the instructor.
