COURSE NUMBER:	RSPT 2360
COURSE TITLE:	Clinical IV—Respiratory Care Therapy/Therapist
COURSE DESCRIPTION:	A health-related, work-based learning experience that enables the student to apply specialized occupational theory, skills, and concepts. Direct supervision is provided by the clinical professional.
COURSE CREDIT HOURS:	3, Clinical/Recitation Hours 16
PREREQUISITE:	RSPT 1160, RSPT 1201, RSPT 1307, RSPT 1410, RSPT 1361, RSPT 1411, RSPT 2310, RSPT 2317, RSPT 1362, RSPT 1471
COREQUISITE:	RSPT 2355, RSPT 2453
COLLEGE REPEAT POLICY:	A student may repeat this course only once after receiving a grade, including “W”

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

At the successful completion of this course, the students will be able to do the following. All clinical competencies will require 100% accuracy and all other aspects of the course require a minimum accuracy of 75%. An overall grade of 75% or more is required to pass this course:

As outlined in the learning plan, apply the theory, concepts, and skills involving specialized materials, tools, equipment, procedures, regulations, laws, and interactions within and among political, economic, environmental, social, and legal systems associated with the occupation and the business/industry and will demonstrate legal and ethical behavior, safety practices, interpersonal and teamwork skills, and appropriate written and verbal communication skills using the terminology of the occupation and the business/industry.

ATTENDANCE POLICY:

1. The student **MUST** notify the clinical instructor as soon as possible in the event of absence or tardiness. Instructors will provide specific information of how they may be contacted.
2. The student must also notify the Director of Clinical Education of any absence by calling 214-491-6259 and leaving a message or leave a message via e-mail.
3. Specific arrival and departure times to and from the clinical site may vary from the times posted in the syllabus. Any alterations in schedule will be determined by the clinical instructor for each site and must be approved by the Director of Clinical Education.
4. A total of three absences are allowed for the semester. After the second absence, the student will be required to meet with the Director of Clinical Education. After the third absence, the student will be required to meet with the Program Director. More than three absences will result in failing clinic and therefore dismissal from the program.
5. Three tardies equals one absence. A tardy is defined as no more than 15 minutes late. If the student is more than 15 minutes late, they will be marked absent for the day.
6. If an emergency happens during clinic (i.e. Child sick at school, death in the family), as long as the student is in clinic for 5 hours, it will not count as an absence.
7. Absences or tardies on a day in which Physician lectures or other scheduled presentations are occurring will be penalized as missed clinical time.
8. Excessive absenteeism or lateness is grounds for dismissal from the program.

Failure to follow the policies stated above may result in any or all of the following actions:

1. Counseling by the clinical instructor and/or DCE.
2. Dismissal from the clinical site (which will be counted as an absence).
3. A Clinical Incident Form being initiated.

Academic Ethics:

The College may initiate disciplinary proceedings against a student accused of scholastic dishonesty. Scholastic dishonesty may involve, but is not limited to, one (1) or more of the following acts: cheating, plagiarism, collusion, use of annotated texts or teacher's editions, and/or falsifying academic records.

Plagiarism is the use of an author's words or ideas as if they were ones' own without giving credit to the source, including, but not limited to, failure to acknowledge a direct quotation.

Cheating is the willful giving or receiving of information in an unauthorized manner during an examination, illicitly obtaining examination questions in advance, copying computer or Internet files, using someone else's work for assignments as if it were one's own, or any other dishonest means of attempting to fulfill the requirements of a course.

Collusion is intentionally or unintentionally aiding or attempting to aid another in an act of scholastic dishonesty, including but not limited to failing to secure academic work; providing a paper or project to another student, providing an inappropriate level of assistance; communicating answers to a classmate about an examination or any other course assignment; removing tests or answer sheets from a test site, and allowing a classmate to copy answers.

Students found guilty of scholastic dishonesty will receive an authorized disciplinary penalty from the Dean of Students Office, and they may also receive an academic penalty in the course where the scholastic dishonesty took place. The professor will determine the appropriate academic penalty.
